There are many ways to watch movies for free online, but not all of them are legal or safe. We have included a list below of the most trusted websites that allow you to watch movies online without spending a penny. Other guides Great Players Sony Crackle, Crackle, or Crackle Plus Once known simply as Crackle, this free streaming site has undergone almost as many name changes as P. Diddy. Originally controlled by Sony, it's now a joint-venture between Sony and Chicken Soup for Soul Entertainment (CSS). This partnership created a new entity called Crackle Plus and it was believed to be the name of the streaming service. However, one look at the site and it's clear that simplicity has won: It's just called Crackle. Whatever you call it, the service includes content from six ad-supported CSS streaming services (Popcornflix, Popcornflix Kids, Popcornflix Comedy, Frightpix, Españolflix, and Trull), as well as some Sony movies and TV shows. You'll find a good number of blockbuster hits like Speed, Transporter, and Close Encounters of the Third Kind, and generous smattering of obscure-but-interesting B-movies. Crackle is a great resource, although constant interruptions from advertisers can get older pretty quickly. The service is offered in 21 countries but has shut down its Canadian, Latin American and Australian offerings. IMDb TV Newer to this roundup is the Amazon-owned IMDb TV (formerly known as Freedive). It offers free TV shows and movies supported by advertising. In February 2020, the service acquired the rights to more than 20 Disney series, including Lost, Desperate Housewives, Malcolm in the Middle and My So-Called Life. It's also the only site that allows you to stream Lost and Malcolm on Wednesday for free. Other TV shows in its relatively small library include Fringe, Heroes, Quantum Leap, and Forensic Files. Films include Memento, La La Land, Drive, Monster, Donnie Darko, Dune, Illusionist, Zodiac, Clue, and more. You can watch IMDb TV on the web, Amazon Fire devices and Apple TVs, and through the Amazon Prime app, which you can find on many smart TVs, tablets and phones. IMDb TV is US-only for now, although European expansion is in the works. Vudu's Walmart-owned Vudu might be better known for its subscription streaming service, but the platform also has an impressive and free ad-supported content section. Titles like Escort, 10,000 days, and offer are good examples of what you'll find. If you take a cruise through the site choosing 4K/HDR titles, there are also one or two free-to-watch options. You'll still need a Vudu account, but you can create one for free. The Vudu app is already supported by a number of platforms, including Roku, Apple TV, and more. In addition, there is an application for most mobile devices. Vudu is only available in usa Hoopla As it is for a good cause: Sign up for a library card and get free downloads or streams of movies, no ads at all. That's the solution when you use Hoopla, a digital media streaming platform that works with local libraries to give members access to rental content online. It's similar to Overdrive, but with more than just ebooks and audiobooks. The availability of any given title will depend on your location and the number of copies available for download, but we found some surprisingly decent flicks when checking in August 2020. Streaming will work on any device with a browser, while downloading requires the Hoopla app on your mobile device. Not every library currently supports Hoopla, so make sure you ask. So far libraries in the U.S. and Canada have access to the Hoopla. YouTube This is a no-brainer. Everyone knows YouTube is the biggest video-hosting service online, and you probably already use the site for silly cat videos and shots of people getting hit with exercise balls. But YouTube has a sizable collection of feature films at its free level as well. Granted, most of them are B-list news, but there are a few quality flicks hiding there. In addition to free, Google-curated movies, there are thousands of movies on the web that don't participate unless you search directly for them. If you're looking for a specific name, especially an older one, it's worth a quick YouTube search to see if someone has posted it. These are not always recorded by movie rights holders, and many are divided into episodes and playlists, but as they say, beggars can't be a choice. Finding free movies on YouTube has gotten harder lately, as more rights holders have decided to offer their movies for rent through the service, and YouTube also has subscription levels such as YouTube Premium and its live TV streaming service, YouTube TV. Still, you'll find plenty to watch, especially if your standards aren't too high when it comes to current quality. Vimeo YouTube may be the biggest video-hosting site, but Vimeo is probably the best. Yes, words fight, but Vimeo has the muscle to support them. The site has a clean layout that has no ads and benefits from an active user community that is generally considered more professional and constructive than YouTube. A lot of great original short and feature films will emerge from this community. Vimeo also has an On-Demand section where users can purchase full-length movies and TV shows. Most are independently manufactured by Vimeo users, but some offers are produced by large studios as well. Either way, Vimeo is a great place to find free, high-quality movies. Roku Channel When Roku originally launched its free, ad-backed Roku Channel, it wasn't technically eligible for this roundup because you had to have one of the company media devices to see it. Roku devices certainly won't break the bank, but they're not free. Now, however, Roku Channel is available to anyone, via the web, as well as through the company's free apps for iOS and Android. The service boasts more than 10,000 titles to choose from, including old favorites such as Con Air, Boyz n Hood, Must Love Dogs, and the Police Academy. You will need to create a free Roku account before you can follow it, but this is a quick and painless process. If you ever decide to expand your options, Roku Channel is now home to several premium subscription options including Showtime, Epix and Starz. Roku Channel is available in the U.S. and Canada. Plex Free Movies and TV Shows Plex is best known as a versatile and easy way to manage and watch your private collection of movies, music, photos and other media. In 2019, however, the company launched its own free streaming service backed by advertising with a collection of films and TV shows from studios such as MGM, Warner, Lionsgate and Legendary. It is available worldwide, although the choice of title will vary greatly depending on the region. You can access a collection of movies and shows from your browser, or on any of the huge number of devices that support plex client software such as Apple TV, Roku, smart TVs, etc. All you need is a free Plex account and you have a good go. For those who already use Plex as their media server, free ad-supported options can be added to existing categories of servers, making the experience completely seamless. Pluto TV Although it may not be as well-known as the above service, Pluto TV is still worthy of your attention. Not only does it host free movies on-demand, but it's also a free live-TV streaming service, hosting content curated from around the web. While the channels vary wildly, we've focused here on movies. Pluto TV currently offers more live movie channels, ideal if you want to watch something, but I don't know what. There are two general-purpose film channels, with the rest focused on specific genres or categories, including Action Movies, Flicks of Fury, Horror 24/7, Classic Movies, Black Cinema, Gravitass Movies, and Asylum. The service operates in the U.S., as do many international cities. Pluto TV's on-demand movie library is relatively small and rotates frequently, but offers as much variety as its live movie channels. It is also available on a ton of devices in addition to computers, including Apple TV, Amazon Fire TV, Roku devices, and more. To learn more about Pluto TV, check out our full service guide. Tubi TV Another up-and-comer, Tubi is very similar to Sony Crackle, in that it offers both free movies and TV episodes. No matter which device you use, it's quite likely that you'll be able to watch Tubi because it's available on Android, iOS, Roku, Apple TV, Amazon Fire TV, Samsung Smart TV, Sony Smart TV, PlayStation 4, Xbox One, and As with the vast majority of services on this list, you will need to need watch a few ads, but that's what keeps the service free. Tubi has content from more than 200 partners, including NBCUniversal, which brings with it nearly 400 classic titles such as Xena: Warrior Princess, Hercules: The Legendary Journeys, A-Team, Punky Brewster, and original versions of Magnum, P.A., Bionic Woman, and Transformers. Cult classics such as Assault on Precinct 13, Sleepaway Camp, and C.H.U.D., along with soon-to-be cult classics such as 10 Cloverfield Lane and No Country for Old Men, can also be found in the growing catalogue. If you use this service to complement Netflix rather than replace it, not the Netflix section will help you find new and interesting movies to watch. Independent and Documentary Films SnagFilms Snagfilms is a video-on-demand site that sports a selection of movies you can't find anywhere else on the web. Founded in 2008, it's amassed about 10,000 independent documentaries and narrative films. There are many rare gems to watch here, and since the founders have worked to create dozens of partnerships, there are also many different streaming devices that support free SnagFilms. The service is currently available as a free app for iOS and Android, but it's also compatible with a variety of Roku devices, Kindles and a host of other streaming devices. The main website is also a breeze for navigation. Snagfilms is available internationally, but some titles are only available in the U.S. and Canada. Canopy Like Hoopla, Kanopy is not only free to use, but it's also commercial-free if you have a library card. Originally established in 2008 in Australia as an educational tool, Kanopy now offers a library of more than 30,000 films through its partnerships with more than 200 libraries. There is a hard time focusing on free independent films and documentaries (the company even has access to many recent films from the A24 catalog), but you'll find all kinds of films available, and even more are on the way thanks to a deal that will see the entire catalog of filmmaker Fred Wiseman coming into service. Canopy is available internationally, but content may vary by location. Top Documentaries Love Documentaries? So do we. You know what they say, the truth is stranger than fiction. Aplytitled Top Documentaries is, hands down, the best place for documentaries. Not every selection is film-length, but a good documentary may not be long - some of the best are below the 60-minute mark. The pride library of over 3000 movies, the site also has a simple and simple layout and categorizes all your movies based on the subject, making it easy to find something that interests you right away. The content is not hosted by the site, but rather curated and embedded from other sites such as YouTube, Vimeo, Daily Motion, etc. It is available internationally, but not all content will work in all locations. Resources for classic movies Archive.org chances are, you are reading this article you are looking for a place to watch newly released movies online. While there's nothing wrong with that, you certainly shouldn't ignore all the fantastic older movies the internet has to offer. Archive.org offers a real treasure trove of old movies that you've probably never heard of, like a handful that you'll recognize. The archive - which is also home to the famous Wayback Machine, which shows you how the internet used to be - has silent movies, black and white horror movies, dark sci-fi movies and an assortment of other films. We may not have all the CGI fantasies we've all grown so used to, but occasionally throwback is a great way to mix things up. Open Culture Open Culture is designed to be your one-stop shop for all things free and cultivated. The site offers hundreds of free online classes to sign up for, thousands of free ebooks to read, and hours after hours of lectures from prominent figures such as Carl Sagan and Leonard Bernstein. It also offers tons of free movies. Here you'll find everything from silent films and Hitchcock-helmed projects to Westerns and film noir. The site even houses some early shorts legends like Quentin Tarantino and Stanley Kubrick. Open Culture can be difficult to navigate, but with over 1,000 free movies available, it's definitely worth the slog. If the Big Five Glories seem to name a kind of banal, it's because the people behind the project spent their time compiling hundreds of free movies from the 1920s to the '50s - aka The Golden Age of Hollywood - instead of coming up with hipsters and edgy names. (If you're curious, it's a reference to the former big five movie houses: 20th Century Fox, RKO Pictures, Paramount Pictures, Warner Bros., and Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer.) If your idea of a fun weekend kicking back and watching Turner Classic Movies, you'll be kicking the Big Five Glories. All movies are considered a public domain, so there is no accessibility limit. Retrovision Retrovision is another public domain site that contains hundreds of classic films from several different eras. The word classic might be for interpretation - there are some movies here that have been made as recently as last year, and not all Retrovision films are high-quality - but there's still a lot of good stuff here. Retrovision is also a well-designed site that allows users to filter based on genre. It's not limited to feature films, because there's a robust collection of classic TV shows to choose from. Shocker Internet Drive-In Shocker Internet Drive-In is a bit of a niche, and its website looks like it was done in the 90s, but it's a great resource. This site is updated every week with the best horror classics which are then available for free download as WMV files on the Snack Bar website. These sites are a fun bit of a blast from the past, with weekly shows framed in digital drive-ins. Users can also purchase DVD copies of any movie on the website for as little as \$3. If you miss the old days internet, if it was more like the Wild West and everything was less polished, it could be for you. The downside of so many different services that are available is that if you have a movie in mind but don't know where to watch it, you have a lot of different catalogs to bite through in hopes of finding it. Fortunately, if you have a smartphone, you probably have access to a tool that can help you. The Apple TV app, available on iOS as well as several other platforms including Apple TV, Roku, Amazon Fire TV and LG and Samsung smart TVs, lets you search more than 50 different streaming services. For Android users, the Google Play Movies & TV app offers similar features, although the number of connected services is smaller. Roku devices now have the Best Free section, which offers up a curated selection of the best free content on the platform, whether you have a specific channel installed or not. This is in addition to its existing cross-service search, although most of what you find will either be available for purchase or hire or will be on a service that requires a subscription.
